

NOTABLE ACHIEVEMENTS

- Noblesville spent \$2 million on its street rehabilitation projects in 2016.
- Hamilton County reported \$14 million of promised new investment in the 2016's second quarter. Noblesville comprised approximately \$7 million of that amount.
- Noblesville is the second fastest growing community in the doughnut communities surrounding Indianapolis.
- Federal Hill District is taking shape with Federal Hill Commons and the construction of BlueSky Technology Partners' new headquarters. Riverview Health also has announced expansion plans to their main building.
- Noblesville opened its second salt barn, which houses 5,000 tons of salt and a 10,500 gallon tank for calcium chloride.
- The Justin Timberlake "Can't Stop This Feeling" community video has had approximately 45,000 views on youtube. That's more than larger cities like Las Vegas and Toronto to name a few.
- Becoming a Class 2 City, the council increased from seven to nine members and the clerk-treasurer position was split.
- More than 500 children participated in the Parks Department's inaugural full-day, week-long summer camp. The Parks' staff also introduced its new mascot, "Felix the Fox."
- Noblesville opened the first Primanti Brothers and Aspen Creek restaurants in the State of Indiana.

EXCITING NEW INITIATIVES

- New aluminum street lights complete with banner arms, flower pot hangers and electrical outlets will replace the old cast iron ones. The first order should be installed around the Downtown Square after the New Year.
- In 2017, the fire department will receive a new ladder truck, fire engine and ambulance.
- Noblesville has applied for a special cultural arts district designation from the state. If approved, the city would become the 7th area in Indiana to achieve this distinction.
- The Parks Department will open Federal Hill Commons in April. While working on Finch Creek Park, the staff continues to expand programming and trails. As part of its partnership with Ivy Tech, the city now manages the school's auditorium. It will include more of the arts and outside organizations.
- Noblesville Utilities is working on design and plans for a \$6.5M phosphorus removal process at the treatment plant.
- Noblesville will take the lead and move forward on Indiana 37 and Pleasant Street improvements while working with INDOT and the county on funding.
- The city is conducting a Housing Study to determine our inventory and trends. This will assist leaders as Noblesville continues to grow in population and development.
- Trail connectivity will be a priority in 2017 as work will begin on the Midland Trace, Levee and Little Chicago Road trails along with Riverwalk Phase III.


SPECIALIZED UNIT
